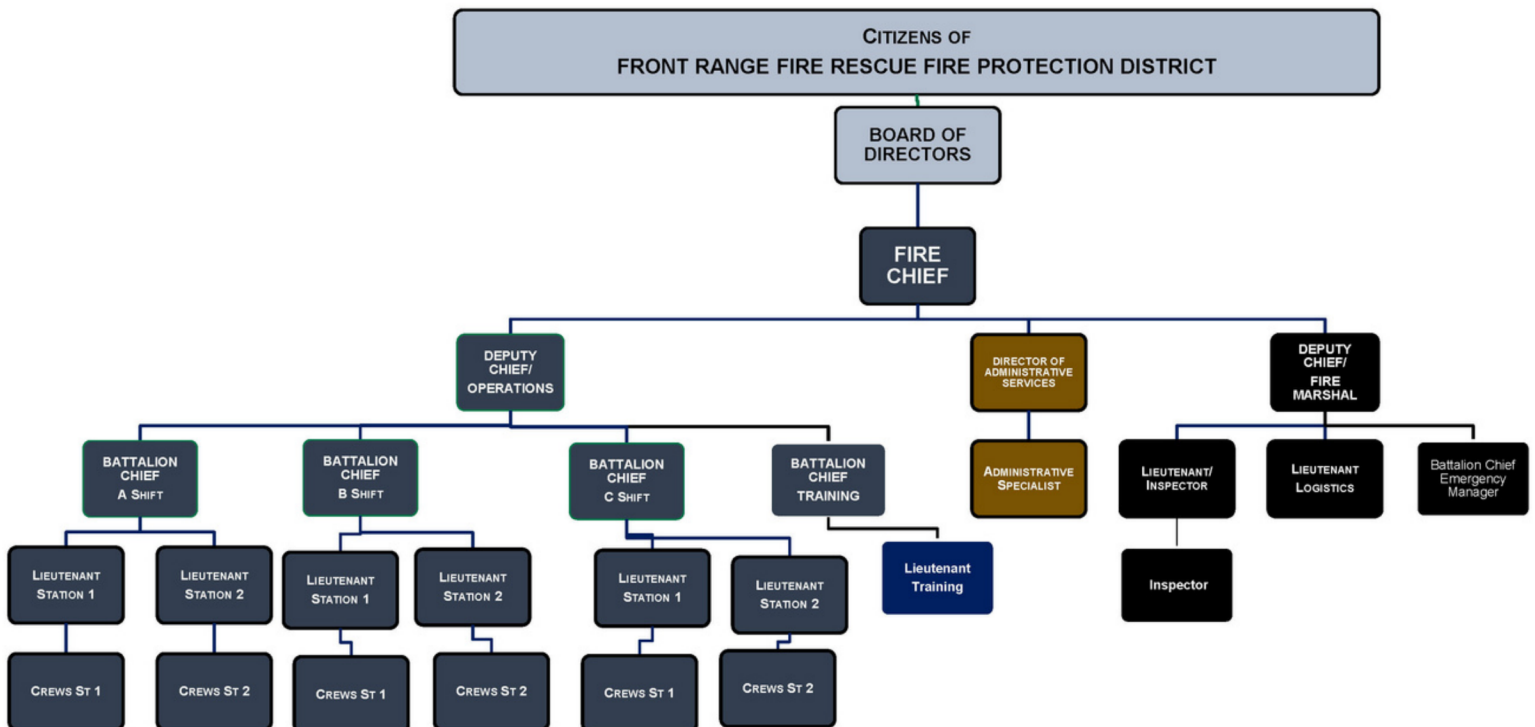
Vision

FROM THE DESK OF FIRE CHIEF MICHAEL WEST

We are pleased to share our annual report with you. 2023 was a busy year for Front Range Fire Rescue. Just look around at the growth in our community. Like all services, more citizens can add to your firefighters' workload and activity level. FRFR is no exception, and I suspect that will continue in the foreseeable future. You can rest easy knowing that we are planning and building for that increase and are prepared for today's and tomorrow's needs. In preparing for tomorrow, here are a few things we accomplished;

- A significant remodel was begun on Station 1 in Johnstown. We will complete this project in early 2024. We want to invite the community out for a rededication ceremony that will be held on June 1, 2024.
- We ordered a new ladder truck. With the increase in larger buildings in our communities, our current ladder will be too small for many of the buildings. Unfortunately, with the state of the supply chain, we don't anticipate delivery until 2025 or later. I wouldn't have believed it if someone had told me ten years ago that fire apparatus delivery times would be 30 months or more.
- We hired seven new members as we increased our numbers in anticipation of opening an additional fire company in 2024.
- We added a Battalion Chief as our designated Emergency Manager (EM). This position will be cooperative with the towns of Johnstown and Milliken. The EM will interface with other area stakeholders such as the counties, police departments, private companies, school districts, and others.
- We added a second full-time training officer. With so many new firefighters, additional training is critical to ensuring they are ready to respond to your emergency.
- We continued our career succession plan as several members completed advanced degrees and training classes. We firmly believe that the public deserves the best educated and trained firefighters who respond to their emergencies. These individuals will also ensure that we have the next generation of FRFR members prepared to lead the department in the coming years.



2024 will be directed toward more planning and developing systems to stay ahead of growth. This will be in the form of developing our next strategic plan and setting us up to possibly seek International Accreditation in the future.

2023 NEW POSITIONS ADDED

BATTALION CHIEF-EMERGENCY MANAGER

The Emergency Manager position maintains our comprehensive emergency plan in coordination with the Towns of Johnstown and Milliken. They are the connection and liaison to our external partners when our communities are faced with significant incidents that span multiple jurisdictions. The Emergency Manager will also work hand in hand with our contacts at Larimer County Office of Emergency Management and Weld County Office of Emergency Management. Over the past 20 years, Emergency Management has grown into an important field for first response agencies, and we are excited to have this position at Front Range Fire Rescue.

LIFE SAFETY & FIRE PREVENTION

Public Education / Community Outreach

We're excited about our collaboration with Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA), Windsor Severance Fire Rescue (WSFR), and the Berthoud Fire Protection District (BFPD). We've secured a regional grant from FEMA totaling over \$560,000! All four agencies, including FRFR is upgrading our Knox Box systems. We're moving from the old-school mechanical key system to a more advanced electronic, or eKey, system. This upgrade is going to make a big difference in how efficiently we can respond to automatic and mutual aid calls. Once everything is up and running, we'll see improved efficiency and enhanced security. The new system allows for better audit capabilities, adding an extra layer of safety to any building with a Knox Box installed. LFRA, WSFR, and FRFR have already taken the first steps. We've purchased and installed new locking mechanisms in all our response vehicles and apparatus. The new eKeys are programmed and in service, making our vehicles even more ready for action. We are in the process of upgrading the existing Knox Boxes in our jurisdictions. It's a bit time-consuming, as it involves touching every Knox Box to swap out the old mechanical lock core for a shiny new electronic core. Our goal is to complete this transition by the end of 2024.

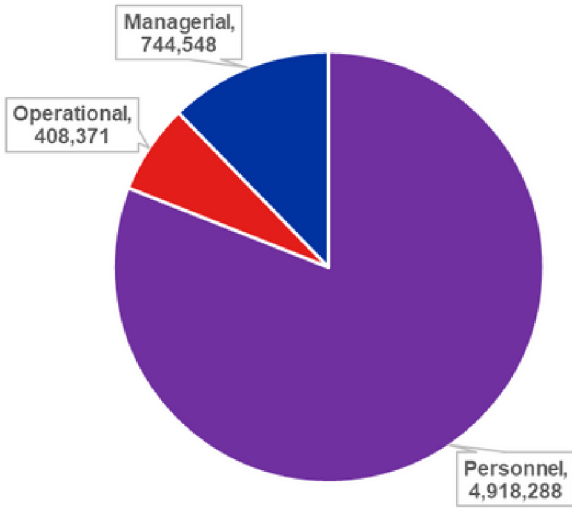
Wellness takes many forms at FRFR. One of our unique programs is the therapy dog program, where members can have their dogs evaluated to ensure that their personality and temperament fit into firehouse life. These dogs then spend time at the firehouse to help our members wind down after tough calls. This program is one of the few in Colorado.

In 2023, Front Range Fire Rescue partnered with the David Lynch Foundation to offer training in Transcendental Meditation. Over half of our members have been taught TM, and all have reported significant benefits. The technique has been proven to reduce sleep deprivation, stress, and other concerns related to the trauma that our responders face.

FRFR has also added cancer screening to our annual exams. "Liquid biopsies" may detect cancer markers sooner, helping our members protect themselves from this disease. Did you know that firefighters are 14% more likely to die from cancer than the general population?

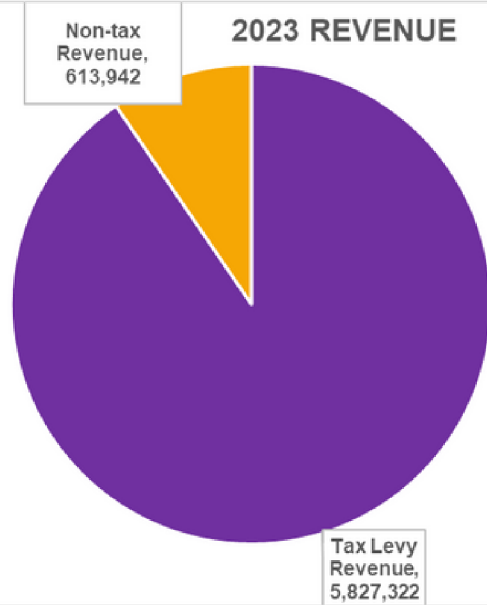

2023 Emergency Operations

In 2023, a number of changes and improvements were made to our emergency response system. The Weld County Regional Communications Center upgraded its Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system, resulting in a more effective system for dispatching firefighters during emergencies. The upgraded system allows for quicker personnel dispatch during significant incidents when the Incident Commander calls for an "additional alarm". We are excited to announce that we anticipate the Weld County CAD working seamlessly with our neighboring county, Larimer County, in 2024, further improving the system.

In addition, we signed several updated automatic aid agreements in 2023. These new agreements allow fire units from FRFR and neighboring agencies to be dispatched whenever they are the closest unit to the emergency. We understand that during emergencies, the person calling for help wants the closest firefighters to arrive first, regardless of the color or patch on their fire engine. This new system has already proven beneficial in a few significant fires in the last half of the year.

Finally, we ordered our newest piece of fire equipment, a 100' Tower Ladder truck. This truck will eventually replace our older 75' ladder truck. You may be wondering why we need such a long ladder, but it's essential to recognize that many of the new buildings in our district are placed well back from their parking lots. Our current ladder cannot reach a person needing assistance on the balcony of their fourth-floor apartment if it can't be parked within about 40 feet of the building. Our constant goal is to ensure we have the right people, equipment, and training for the emergencies we could face.

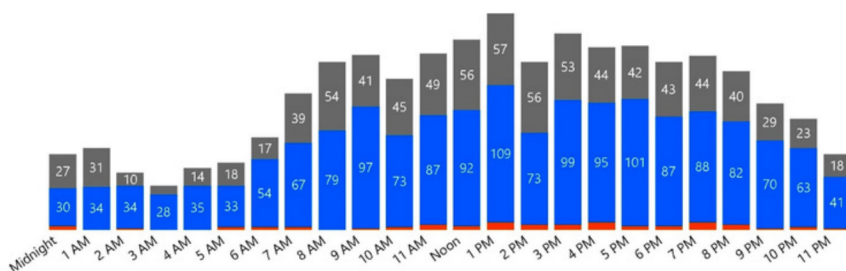

2023 INCIDENTS 2,568

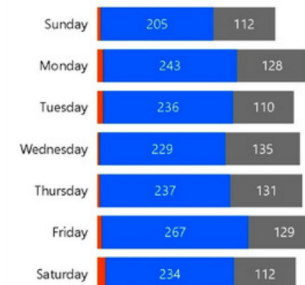
of Incidents by Hour of the Day

of Incidents by Weekday and Incident Category

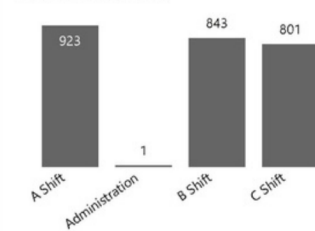
Incident Category ● Fire ● EMS ● Other



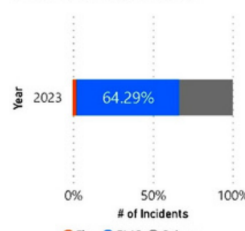
Top Stations by # of Incidents



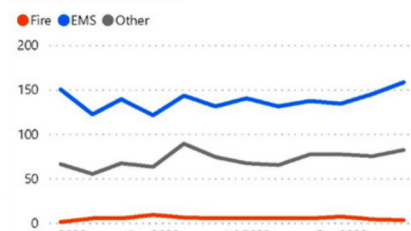
of Incidents by Shift

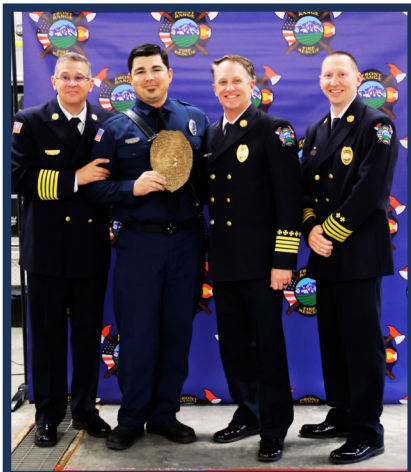

Looking Ahead 2024

This year, we will be reopening and rededicating FRFR Fire Station 1 in Johnstown. This project is essential for our future as it will increase our training opportunities within the district, allow us to hire more staff in a comfortable environment, and provide additional office space for our busy fire inspectors and plan review personnel. The addition of firefighter decontamination areas is of utmost importance as it will reduce the risk of cancer caused by toxic gases our members are exposed to at each fire.

In the first half of 2024, we will complete a detailed Community Risk Assessment (CRA) and a Standards of Cover (SOC) document. These studies will enable us to fully understand our current community needs and ensure that we have the very best benchmarks for constructing new firehouses, adding personnel, and meeting the needs of our ever-increasing population.

The second half of 2024 will concentrate on an updated Strategic Plan that will guide the future of our organization for the next 3-5 years. While our previous plan served us well, the rate of change in our district necessitates a top-to-bottom overhaul to help us meet the community's and our members' expectations.

We are also adding 12 new positions to staff our next fire company this year. We plan to open this unit during the summer, just in time for the heavy demands often accompanying our dry and windy seasons.

Can you help us? We are looking for property for a more extensive training ground. Ideally, it is greater than 5 acres, has nearby access to water mains, and is away from homes. If you have a property that you would like us to consider, please get in touch with us at info@FRFR.CO

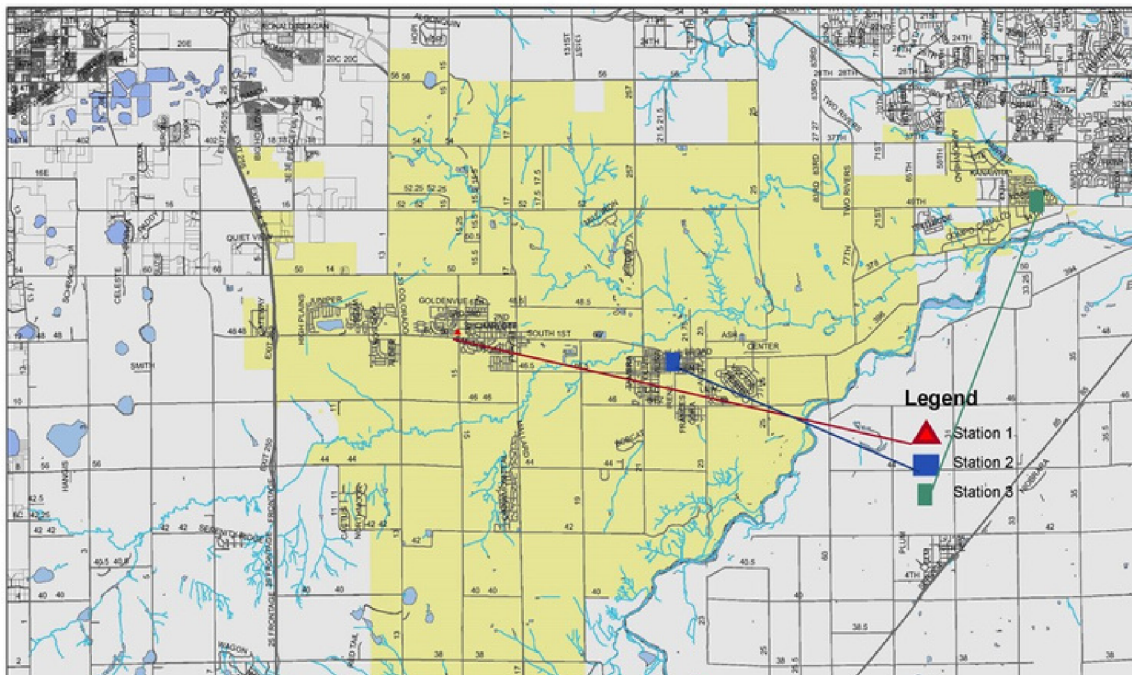
